Summary of progress to date: Village Survey (August/September 2018) and Village Meeting (26 September 2018). Clear evidence of village support for new hall and possibility of Big Lottery Funding to max £500,000* subject to a strong bid. All those who'd expressed interest in closer involvement on the Village Survey had been invited to attend Nov. 29th meeting (see names above).

Formation of a Village Hall Project Advisory Board: The New Village Hall Project will be led by the existing Village Hall Committee (chaired by George Brett-Reynolds) with the support of a wider Project Advisory Board. Looking ahead, this Advisory Board will be divided into areas of interest & expertise, including design and planning, bid writing, finance, fundraising, equipment and facilities.

New Village Hall "brainstorm": The meeting was invited to discuss aspects of design and layout of a new hall. Comments and suggestions were collated by Julie Dyson who offered to approach her architect for initial plans and costings. These would be circulated before Christmas for comment and amended by mid-January. The meeting thanked Julie for her help with this important first step. Funding sources were also discussed.
